News From the Military Front

Publication of this edition of the newsletter fell at the same time as the handover of RSM at the Regiment and so due to the very heavy commitment load on RSM Alfie Conetta there is no RSM’s Column. It will appear as usual in the next issue along with a ‘bio’ of the RSM.

News from the Civilian Front

Staffing: As with the rest of the Civil Service pressure exists to reduce costs through savings measures etc. Following various savings cuts and recruitment bans the Defence Geographic Centre (DGC) has an allowed establishment of 506 (including 13 military staff) for FY 10/11 this compares to an establishment of 576 at the start of FY 09/10.

Pride Update: Programme to Rationalise and Integrate the DIS Estate (Pride) is progressing well with work on the new building at RAF Wyton underway with handover of the building scheduled for December 2011. Those elements of the Intelligence Collection Group (ICG) that are planned for relocation to Wyton include HQ ICG, HQ JAGO, 42 Engineer Regt, JARIC, and elements of DGC. A number of DGC geospatial analysts will be embedded into Wyton as detachments to support what will become the Defence Geospatial Intelligence Fusion Centre (DGIFC). All moves planned to be complete by the end of 2014. Also, site assessments of the five potential future locations for the Royal School of Military Survey (RSMS) are nearing completion.

Work is now complete within both Richmond and Hotine Buildings in order to accommodate displaced Defence Intelligence and ICG staff from London as part of the programme to close the Old War Office Building, these staff will start arriving from July 10 onwards.

Also, Defence Estates are investigating the feasibility of alienating and selling the North West corner of the Feltham site which includes the Officers' Mess and surrounding area.

DGC Modernisation: As reported previously DGC's Production Division has been undergoing a major modernisation programme in terms of new equipment, hardware and software. This programme is nearing completion and will provide common systems and commercial GIS software applications across the majority of Production thereby allowing greater flexibility in tasking and production of the range of geospatial products.

Continuing the production theme, DGC has continued to be heavily involved in supporting Operation Herrick, this includes close co-operation with geo staff in theatre. In addition to standard topographic line maps, new products have been developed and supplied, such as Cross Country Movement and Ditch Analysis all of which are fully attributed digital datasets.

There is a growing interest in understanding Ethnicity and Tribalism in relation to the geography. This has resulted in the creation of a Human Geography Section which produces a range of items to satisfy requirements, including reports, digital data and hardcopy maps.

Also, a new development is Enhanced Foundation (E-Foundation) Data. DGC will lead on the development and delivery of E-Foundation data which is additional layers of contextual or thematic data to topographic foundation data. These additional data layers may include elements of geospatially referenced data about the physical and human environment, reference data from multiple domains.

British Forces Germany (BFG) Map Depot Closure: The end of 2009 saw the closure of the BFG Map Depot with all mapping being transferred to the Feltham site.

EXCERPTS FROM OPERATIONAL LIFE

Operation HERRICK 11, Afghanistan

The following are excerpts from articles written by soldiers from 42 Engineer Regiment (Geo) for their regimental magazine. Each gives a flavour of what life is like for Geo soldiers deployed to Afghanistan where young junior soldiers are operating, often on their own, in remote Battlegroup locations.

I dismounted the Chinook Helicopter it was dark but it appeared that Main Operating Base (MOB) Lashkar Gah did not change much, even the flight path from Bastion seemed familiar. I arrived at the waiting area but there was no one there to meet me, that was not problem I left here two years ago and I remembered my way around. I took the route around via Grenade Alley the memories came rushing pack as I go past tent ten, which used to be home during Herrick 6. I arrive at the HQ and now I realised that a few things had in-fact changed, there was now a perimeter fence around the HQ, luckily I bumped into Frankie (LCpl Green).

The Counter-IED tasks vary from very interesting to slightly boring at times however, it is predominantly very interesting. The CIED Task Force brings together personnel from all three services, this is all part of a bigger plan to combat the IED incidents that are currently the number one killer in Helmand. Most of us were on the Brigade MRX so that made it a lot easier when I arrived because I knew most of the people I would be working with.


After a few weeks here we found out that we would be staging on in the Sangar, I must admit I was sort of looking forward to it as I was getting tired of the seeing the four corners of the camp walls. It seems not much has changed outside either, it looked almost the same as it did when I was here during the war on Herrick 7. The normal working day starts at 0800 and finishes at 2200 hrs, they are long days but there's work to be done. On Fridays we have a lie in and start work at 0900, but Saturday is the best day here luckily we get the football games on Sky, however when the Sky is not working we get stuck into the Newbury Weekly News.

Cpl 'Keva' Hackshaw, HQ Task Force Helmand (TFH), Counter-IED TF

So far I've been moved about through central Helmand, initially at Bastion, then up to the highest region we in TFH (Musa Qulah) which was freezing! Especially during a midnight sangar duty, even with four thick layers on making me look like the Michelin man. For anybody who thinks they have done team medic training for nothing it's far from the truth. There was a suicide bomber in the local village and it was hands on when local civilians came through the front gate. Anyway from Musa Qulah I eventually arrived in Lashkar Gah.

LCpl 'Meerkat' Rogers, HQ TFH

During my time in Sangin I worked along side 2 RIFLES for the majority of my tour. The majority of work carried out in Sangin was the production of patrol mapping to help the lads on the ground. It was good to see that the work you were doing was being to put to good use and not going up on some officer's wall!

The facilities at Sangin are fairly basic with all washing carried out in the canal that runs through the centre of the Forward Operating Base (FOB). With an ICAT Helicopter being shot down 600m short of the FOB while flying over the green zone, in my time there fresh food was hard to come by. However, if you liked noodles and spam you were in for a treat as this was the only dinner we had for around 3 months, so forget the Atkins diet and try the Sangin Weight loss plan!

Guard Shifts were another highlight of my time at Sangin completing around 3 a week. It was on one of these fateful sangar duties during the Afghan national elections after around 7 hours of on/off Indirect Fire, I put down around a 100 GPMG rounds onto a Taliban mortar position that was targeting the sangar position I was currently occupying. (At one point a mortar round landed 50m away, but even at that distance I was suffering from squeaky bum time!) That was the most exciting day during my tour.

LCpl 'Corky' Corcoran, Battlegroup (North), Sangin

After spending the first half of my tour in affluent and salubrious Lashkar Gah, I was 'lucky' enough to be transported back in time to Patrol Base Two. PB2 is in the heart of Helmand province and is the headquarters of the Babaji Battle Group. On my arrival in the patrol base I was not only informed that I was to provide geographic support but I would also have to actually build the patrol base! Needless to say Geo work took a back seat and the erection of tents took centre stage. It's not that often that we Geo get to work closely with the mainstream Sappers,

luckily for me I was taken in by the lads of 23 Squadron RE and their courageous leader Lieutenant Dan "Turkish" "The Jazz" Hands (Ex Geo). The Sappers in PB2 were responsible for putting the infrastructure into the patrol base, much to the distaste of the Coldstream Guards who have to rely heavily on us for the small comforts in life such as plumbing!

With the patrol base built, it was time to get on with some of my primary trade, which unbeknown to me had been changed to Guardsman! The next 3 weeks or so were spent getting intimate with a

GPMG and a sangar. This is not to say that I didn't get some Geo work done.

Geographic support has been provided to operations and rebuilding projects in the Babaji community, such as route Trident road build and establishing schools in the area. The work remains varied and interesting as one moment I am providing terrain analysis products to the Battlegroup Engineer and then the next moment I am printing out the Alphabet for a local school's wall! I have used the majority of the skills learnt on the ME Geo Class 1 course to cover the patrol base in signs!

Colonel Michael Cobb PhD 1916 – 2010

Michael Cobb gained national recognition when in 2008 at the age of 91 he became the oldest person ever to be awarded a PhD by Cambridge University.

Michael went to France with the BEF and was evacuated through Dunkirk and then served in the North Africa and then with the airborne forces. After the war he joined Military Survey and was in charge of the troop train which moved the Survey Training Centre from Ruabon to Longleat and spent the entire journey on the footplate. He rose to command 42 Survey Engineer Regiment from 1953 until 1956, during which time it moved from Fayid in the Suez Canal Zone to Zyyi in Cyprus, and was then Commandant of the School of Military Survey until 1959. His final tour with Military Survey was as Deputy Director Large Scale Surveys at the Ordnance Survey.

He retired from the Army in 1965 and worked for the cartographic company Geographia until retirement in 1971. In 1978 he began working on his magnum opus - *The Railways of Great Britain: A Historical Atlas* - which was to show all the railway lines of Great Britain opened to traffic between 1807 and 1994 annotated with historical detail. The atlas was completed and published 25 years later in 2003 and it was for this immense project that he was awarded his doctorate on the 19th of July 2008, making him possibly the world's third oldest person to be awarded a PhD.

Michael died on the 23rd of June and Branch President John Elder attended his funeral in Honiton on the 8th of July.

Dave Herriott

Dave was an ex Harrogate boy joining with Intake 50B. He was an air surveyor by trade and after leaving the service set up his own survey company. He died in his sleep on Easter Sunday morning after 12 months of poor health. Dave leaves a widow Sylvia and daughters Linda and Trilby.

Alf 'Tommy' Thompson

Alf Thompson, known universally as Tommy, passed away on Thursday the 8th of July. He was a former SSM of both 47 Cartographic Squadron and the School of Military Survey.

20 YEARS OF NON-STOP OPS

In the summer of 1990 Saddam Hussein invaded Kuwait and British Forces joined the international coalition that was put together to liberate that country. So started twenty years of continuous operational deployments – the First Gulf War, the various operations in the Balkans, Iraq again and Afghanistan which looks likely to continue for some time yet. With a soldier's full career being 22 years and the first two of those taken up with training, there is now a generation of whose entire career has comprised training for and deploying on operations – witness to this situation are the arrays of medals on SNCOs chests.

Which Unit, Where, When...the Answer (Maybe)



Many thanks for the suggestions from several readers as to the answer to the question posed in the last newsletter as to the story behind the photos of a mix of wartime Hippo and 1960's print train vehicles disembarking from an LCT.

The answer seems to be Exercise Stowaway over the weekend of 18 – 21 March 1965 when the Hippo equipped 135 Regiment (as it then was) and a detachment from 22 Litho Squadron with its new Helio print train wagon practised loading and off loading from an LCT. The vehicles embarked at Poole and sailed to Portland where they disembarked and drove to Chickerell Camp.

CAST IN STONE

Thought is now being given to what should happen to the myriad historical and commemorative items scattered around Denison Barracks, particularly the two Messes, when the units move to what will be shared accommodation – there almost certainly won't be room for all of the Military Survey/Geo memorabilia. However, there is one item that almost certainly will have to stay at Hermitage and will forever be testament to 'The School' – the Sergeants' Mess foundation stone – although probably now un-noticed by all who pass by it.

For decades Military Survey was awash with two rumours; that the School was to be rebuilt and that the Regiment was to move from Barton Stacey. First firm indications that the old American hospital at Hermitage was to be replaced occurred in the early Sixties and were supported by a scale model that was proudly shown to all new entrants to Military Survey and details even appeared in the Newbury Weekly News complete with dates. Alas, this initiative was to come to nought only to be replaced again by rumours.



When, in 1974, 2 Survey Staff Specialist Course* came to ponder what to present to the Sergeants Mess at the end of their course it seemed like a good idea to highlight the 'rebuild' rumour that was once more going the rounds. A handsome foundation stone was produced by the local monumental mason and housed in a smart glass fronted case to which a small brass hammer was attached by a chain and a brass plaque was fixed to the front which proclaimed "*In case of rebuild: break glass*".

And so it eventually came to pass in the late Seventies that the small brass hammer was used to break the glass and the stone was passed to the builders of the smart new Mess who embedded it into the entrance foyer for all to see today and probably all who pass by in years to come – whoever they may be!
