As will be appreciated Allan has had an amazing life and many Surveyors have been in touch with recollection of times spent with him and his family, both whilst serving and afterwards. Enlisting in 1943, his wartime career is quite fascinating, so much so that we will publish more details in our next newsletter but he was an Operation OVERLORD veteran and served from Normandy right through Belgium and Germany taking part in OP MARKET GARDEN and OP PLUNDER. On VE Day his troop were apparently guarding a Schnapps factory and so he was able to celebrate in some style.

Later, after undertaking the Long Print Course he was posted to 42 Survey Engineer Regiment at Zyyi Camp, Cyprus, and remained with Survey for the rest of his career including a tour as the last OC of 32 Lithographic Squadron, before it merged with 22 Squadron. After leaving the Army, Allan went on to join Ordnance Survey and later did consultancy work.

Allan and his wife, Beryl, retired to the South Coast. Subsequently widowed, Allan lived independent life until quite recently. He now lives in a retirement home in Newbury where he celebrated his birthday with family... and a massive cake!

On arriving at the Rhondda, we saw that many of the houses and businesses had street art on them. They were of various different subjects and themes. I had the idea that I wanted to put a mural on the garage wall in memory of my dear father.

I contacted Tee2Sugars and enquired if this was something he would like to do. He jumped at the chance and we arranged for him to visit and do the artwork in December 2023.





Now having booked Tee2Sugars, I needed to decide what would be appropriate to have on the wall. I wanted it to be personal to my father but also acknowledge the major part in his life apart from family, his military career. I put together some ideas and, using the book that Alan Gordon had written used the Fougasse as one of the 'must haves' including the Royal Engineers emblem.

Tee2Sugars suggested that the artwork needed 3 focal points and noticed that my father's boots were sitting there, still shining, really polished so that you could see your face in them. That was the 3rd element decided.

Tee2Sugars worked tirelessly on the wall for about a week, whilst I kept popping out for a nose! The results were fantastic and he made a video and sent the pictures over, which I have shared on Facebook and it has gone viral! The mural is an eyecatcher and very much loved in the community.

## Hamilton Prize Winner – Captain Ross Campbell RE



Ross Campbell receiving the Hamilton Prize from Archie Hamilton's Grandson, our Chairman, Mark Burrows Capt Ross Campbell was selected as the winner of this year's Hamilton Prize being considered as the best 'all-rounder', this includes representing the course, keeping the Senior Instructor honest, and being a true team player and all-round good egg.

The Hamilton Prize was set up by Archie Hamilton OBE, one of the early co-founds of the School of Military Survey, which was set, after the war, in Longleat. It subsequently moved to the 'Camp' at Hermitage.


The prize was set up with a trust fund and the award was to be made to the individual on the Army Survey Course that made the greatest contribution to the course. It was very much a subjective view and the Chief Instructor made the final decision. There was a great emphasis pulling together the course as a team with a mix of UK. and often overseas. Commonwealth, students. Supporting some of the students overseas and their families was to be taken into consideration. This included

helping them with some of their studies and understanding the quaintness of British traditions.

There was little room for the 'inky swots' that sat in the corner with their books and abhorred the idea of going out in the cold; nor was their scope for the 'prima donnas' who routinely put themselves first in the line.

While Archie Hamilton died in the latter half of the last century, his daughter, (Mark Burrows' mother) kept the trust fund topped up so that the award could be meaningful from a financial perspective. Mark hopes to follow suit, so long as we have the relevant course run at the Royal School of Military Survey.

## <u>The Cyprus Presentation Map</u> <u>by Ted May</u>



Cyprus Map


This is one of 4 or 5 reproductions of the Map of Cyprus. At the time of its production, in 1959, I was the Sgt in charge of the Proofing department at Zyyi in Cyprus and I proofed the map.

I had passed out from Harrogate in 1955 as a Lithographic Proofer and my first 2 years were spent in the Proofing department of 14 Squadron who were then located in Dortmund, West Germany.

I was posted from Germany to Cyprus in September 1957. My friend from Harrogate, Chalky White, and I were posted to 42 Regiment at Zyyi. We managed to get permission to move between the units by motor bike. This was a great adventure and we visited many places. We arrived in Cyprus, at the right time, in September 1957 to be met by Dave Guest, another Harrogate friend. After Germany the very best accommodation available at Zyyi was a tent, holding 4 soldiers, which was a real step down, but the weather was great and I had lots of friends from Harrogate and my home town of Gillingham.

Soon after arriving I was sent to 3 Map Depot at Polimedia for a short time with the reason that I was a disciplined NCO. The unit was commanded by Maj Store with a Capt, SSM and a WO1. The main job was counting, stacking and recording map stocks that had been shipped from Egypt. There were about 20 military personnel and a few civilians. It wasn't a happy unit, but I must say Maj Store, who rode a motor bike each day, helped me get my bike out of customs at Nicosia. I also spent my 21st birthday there and in all served just under 3 months before returning to the Regiment, at the end of December 1957.

I was promoted to Sgt in February 1958 at the age of 21 years and 2 months. I was VERY HAPPY to be put in charge of the Proofing department, graining and paper store. Paddy Burns was the Storeman and Grainer, and in the paper store I was lucky to have two civilians, both from Italy, and they were also very well-trained printers. The Proofing Department was a mix of 1 power assisted press and hand presses. The power assisted was with a blanket cylinder only but was a great help in the heat.

I was given the task of proofing the Cyprus map by the OC, Maj Marles (*Allan Marles who recently celebrated his 100<sup>th</sup> birthday – see above*), so it could be used as a presentation piece for the outgoing Director of Military. One copy was also produced for the OC (he took over from Maj Sleep) but I also produced other copies for D Gale, Peter Dale and of course my copy!

The story of this map, from what I remember, was that a Field Survey party were out in the field on one of their Survey tasks, when they came across this map in a taverna. They brought it back to the Regiment and it was reproduced into a print task as a presentation piece. I do know that during its time in the Litho Artist's section, one or two additions were made (ie names). I know the location of one was 'Payne'. I am not sure whether that was implemented by Mick Payne (although I can't remember him being at Zyyi) or Satch Payne who I met at Polimedia in 3 Map Depot during my first 3 months in Cyprus. The name Payne is located above Limassol to the left just up from the coast. The job arrived in the Proofing department and I remember in those days most jobs were proofed before being printed using Zinc plates, with possibly gum reversal or albumen. One interesting point about this map is the original copies were printed on Watmans handmade paper and the colours used were in black, red, pink, green, green tint, blue, blue tint, yellow and buff, adding up to 9 colours all told

The second image shows a 1959 Christmas card I received from my friend, Dave Guest, which utilised the presentation map of Cyprus. I received the card when I was at the London School of Printing and Graphic Arts.


1959 Cyprus Map Christmas Card

## Reflections on Nijmegen Marches 1985-87 by James Prain



#### Switch of Branch Accounts to Central REA Bank Account – Your Action is Required



#### **RSMS Armillary Sphere - An Appeal For Information**

We believe that most personnel will be aware of the Armillary Sphere, which sat in front of the Headquarters building within Denison Barracks at Hermitage. With the arrival of 77 Brigade into the barracks, the RSMS had to consolidate into three of the buildings and the sphere re-located. We will be covering the sphere's movement in an article in the next newsletter.

One thing that has become apparent is that there is no history as to the origins of the Armillary Sphere. No one seems to know where it came from, who purchased it and when it was originally erected. #### **DEATHS OF OLD COMRADES**

#### Stephen (Steve) Sykes

The Branch was saddened to hear of the recent death of Steve Sykes. He was 73 years old. A native of Lancaster after attending Lancaster Royal Grammar School he studied architecture at the University of Bath gaining both a BSc and BArch.

He went to the RMCS in 1976 and Military Survey first met him in January 1979 when he joined 63 ASC Course. He thought he had the best Christmas present our masters in Military Survey could dish out when he found out he was one of only three officers on the course, and that the other two

were Canadians. (It is believed to be the smallest ASC course ever.) He was obviously delighted (!) and was designated to be the course senior before he even arrived. He made an outstanding job of it, too.

Steve related really well with the Field Survey departmental staff of all ranks and one can understand his urge, under the circumstance in which he found himself, to relate to and befriend many of the British RE's, both officers and NCOs too. Something that he always maintained throughout his service.

Steve's first tour from the ASC was with Field Troop 19 Sqn then based in Barton Stacey and, having bought a house in Newbury, used to car-share with Ian Thurgate who was the Tp SSgt. They both had small cars at the time and so it was quite normal for Helga to lick the driver's ear during the journey – for those not 'in the know' Helga was Steve's beloved Weimaraner dog.

Being single, Steve frequently ate out and was a regular at Indigo Bay, an Indian restaurant just around the corner from his house. He was a frequent visitor and was honoured by the staff, with his own specially reserved table.

After his tour with 42 Regiment Steve served in Germany as SO2 Geo HQ BAOR and as OC ASLS at Wyton. He also did a tour in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia based in Riyad, and then served in PPCU at Feltham where he became friends with Duncan and Maggie Jacobs – Duncan had been a Survey WO1 and Maggie then worked in Svy 3 and, later, went on to become Director DGC. Steve often stayed with Duncan and Maggie when home from an overseas posting, and visited them at their home in France after Maggie retired.

Steve's last tour was as Chief Geo AFSOUTH in Naples. Upon his retirement he bought a property in Ireland complete with paddocks so that he could satisfy his long-held wish to keep horses. At one time he had two horses and five dogs, some of whom he had re-homed in Italy.

He loved his animals.... Mick Perry remembers the two Bernese dogs that he had in Germany..... "Many a mess member found themselves on dog sitting duties. They could slobber for England!! and that.... "At some point he also acquired a cockatoo named Raffy and it could ululate better than

the best lady from the middle east. I'm not sure if he ever kept it, but we had to look after it and it was an absolute pain. Better than an alarm clock though!" Maggie Jacobs confirmed that, indeed, Steve did keep Raffy – it "lived to a ripe old age and accompanied Steve to Ireland"


Steve was a very private man but very well-liked and respected by all those he worked for and with. A common theme in all the tributes paid to him was that he was a true gentlemen.

Noel enlisted in 1951 and was commissioned in 1953. He attended No 24 ASC later followed by a posting to the Military Staff at Ordnance Survey.

After attending the Long Print course at the London College of Printing he became SI Litho at SMS which was followed by a tour as DAD Svy NEAREAST & Gulf.

This was followed by a tour as AD Svy HQ UKLF and then one as AD Svy BF Cyprus. He returned to UK to take up post as CO 42 Survey Engineer Regiment 1980-82.

Noel returned to Cyprus to take up a Lt Col (SL) appointment as D Comd Episkopi Garrison and for his last year of service he held another Lt Col (SL) post, this time at AAC Chepstow.

He retired in 1987.
